## NYSTA President's Report

Greetings Fellow Trappers,

The most recent By Laws changes, as published in the last issue of *Traplines* were voted on and approved by the membership. **Thank you** for all who took the time to vote.

On April 22<sup>nd</sup> of this year the JTI Committee met with the NYSDEC Furbearer Management Team. This is the first time we have met with the FMT in over a year. Knowing that a study of fisher population and distribution had been ongoing with the Department for nearly two years and that a new draft management plan for fisher was scheduled to be finalized this year, we were very interested in learning what may be proposed and when. We were happy to learn that the preliminary outcome of the last two winters of intense camera/hair sample studies across the Southern Zone indicated a strong and increasing fisher population throughout the study area. The positive study results, along with the increase of sightings reported, should pave the way to new fisher harvesting opportunities for trappers in various WMUs where we have never before experienced open seasons for fisher.

On the negative side of the fisher issue, the FMT reported that there has been a decade long, gradual decline of fisher harvested in the Central and Eastern Adirondack Regions. They also expressed concern that the number of females fisher harvested exceeds the number of males harvested in that same area. Although they feel that this is an indication of a declining population, some of these same biologists have indicated to me in the past that birth rate ratios of females is normally higher than males in their litters and that I should expect to harvest more females than males during the season. Have things changed?

### **President's Report**

A very lively and lengthy discussion of this issue ensued as the Department feels "something" needs to be done. NYSTA and the JTI Committee are committed to wise and ethical management and use of our furbearers and other natural resources while at the same time protecting our trapping heritage, which includes our ability to harvest NY's many varied furbearers. I think it will suffice to say at this point that NYSTA's JTI Committee did not at all agree with several of the management options the FMT is considering. The options that we felt NY's trappers could be most comfortable with seemed to be those that the FMT may be the least comfortable with, unfortunately.

The JTI Committee, at the time of this meeting, and at the NYSTA Board of Directors meeting a few days later, were also informed that the Department would like our support regarding some changes in language of a few trapping regulations. Some language changes are deemed necessary for clarification of the true intent of these regulations. I don't foresee trappers having any major concern with these changes but NYSTA will wait to see the exact language before finalizing our position.

Two other regulation changes were also proposed. One would allow trapping within 15 feet of a beaver lodge during a closed beaver and/or otter season with the same sizes and style traps as are presently allowed within 15 feet of a beaver dam during the closed beaver and/or otter seasons. We were told that there was also some internal discussion regarding dropping the 15 foot restriction altogether so that beaver trappers would also be able to trap within 15 feet of a beaver lodge. The second change would be to reduce the size of the body gripping trap required to comply with the trigger

regulations while trapping beaver during a closed otter season in the Southern Zone. The Department would like to reduce the size from 9 inches to 8 ½ inches so that all brands of #330 size body grips would have to be set in compliance with the trigger regulation. #280 size body grips would still be unaffected.

The new fisher management plan should be in the State Register for public comment late this summer according to members of the Furbearer Management Team. I would expect to see these other regulation changes in the Register at the same time. It will be extremely important for all trappers to voice their opinions and comments during this public comment period, both positive and negative. We will try to keep you updated on these issues.

**Our next newsletter may be too late to get pertinent updates to you so PLEASE check the NYSTA website and the NY Trappers Forum for updates. Now would be a great time to make sure Angie has your email address on her "Trappers Alert List" as we will be utilizing that to get the word out to our membership as well.**

***Pat Arnold receives the "Outstanding Conservationist" award from the NY Chapter of The Wildlife Society.***

Nominated by Gordon Batcheller, Chief Wildlife Biologist, Bureau of Wildlife, NYSDEC

***Highlights taken from the nomination letter:***

Pat Arnold was nominated for a singular achievement in starting what is now known as the "Pat Arnold Youth Trapper's Camp and in recognition of her leadership and vision in getting this going and sponsored by NYSTA.

Each camp hosts about 15-20 young people, both boys and girls. Pat coordinates the recruitment and training of the teaching cadre, with nearly a 2:1 student to teacher ratio. In other words, these kids receive personal attention from expert adult teachers. NYSDEC is a full partner in this program, and we participate by providing instruction in the wildlife management aspects of trapping so that these kids understand that they are part of a much larger system, with its roots in the North American Model of Conservation. We also bring in Environmental Conservation Officers so that the kids gain an appreciation for the importance of our laws and regulations. In this way, we are helping to build a strong cohort of trapper leaders/conservationists that we can count on to support our wildlife management programs as they enter adulthood.

Pat worked with us at the outset to ensure that the trapper Camp experience was focused on outstanding teaching and field experience. To that end, DEC issued Pat a special permit to enable the kids to actually set traps and harvest furbearers under the direct supervision of our expert teachers. With the animals harvested, the kids then learn how to prepare the pelts for the market, but before that our biologists talk to them about the importance of collecting biological information from the carcasses, and the role of trappers in helping us ensure that these species are managed in a sustainable manner. And I must say that it is very gratifying to me to learn and see that some of the most enthusiastic students watching over a carcass dissection are the girls.

With the success of the Youth Trapper Camp, Pat has done us all a great service in advancing our conservation agenda. She did this on her own, and used her personal skills at persuasion and leadership to assemble a legacy program that will serve us well for many years to come.

I hope that your committee will see fit to award Pat Arnold the TWS "Outstanding Conservationist" Award for 2014.

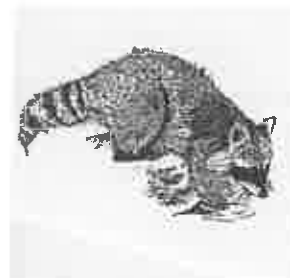

**County Reports**

**Cortland County Trappers Association News**

The Cortland County Trappers Association has a permanent exhibit at the Maple Festival held annually in Marathon in early spring. This year's event was held April 5-6. The first day brought scattered snow showers while the second day was warm and sunny. A large crowd was there for the event. It is the major fund raiser for the Association to support our activities. Several items are sold including tanned pelts, honey products, gun raffle tickets, 50/50 tickets and club memberships. A collection of traps, mounted furbearers and tanned pelts is also displayed and generate lots of questions about the fur resource and harvest techniques. For many it is the first time they have seen some of these animals. For others, animals they have seen in the wild were identified based on the description and location where they were observed.

One of the Association's activities is to offer a \$500 scholarship to local high school seniors going to college to pursue a career in natural resources management (hopefully wildlife management) and make an impact on conserving New York State's natural resources. This year's recipient is Tyler Petty from Cincinnatus who will be entering the Finger Lakes Community College majoring in Wildlife Law Enforcement. It was clear to the scholarship committee that he intends to stay in New York and become a DEC Conservation Officer.

Another activity we have is placing Fur-Fish-Game magazine in each high school library in the county. The gift is appreciated judging by the "Thank You" notes we receive.

Four members (Butch Jenks, Dale Beckwith, Al Martek and I) participated in trapper certification courses this past fall and winter and certified 72 students.

In January, hours before our scheduled meeting at our host club, the Solon Sportsmen's Club, the clubhouse was destroyed by fire. Since then the McGraw Sportsman's Club has graciously offered their clubhouse for our meetings. We greatly appreciate their hospitality.

**Minutes of New York State Trapper's

Board of Director's Meeting  
January 18, 2014**

**Call To Order**

The meeting was called to order by President Rockwood at 9:20 with the Pledge of Allegiance. The minutes of the previous meeting were approved with a couple of minor word changes. President Rockwood made a couple of announcements; NYSTA will auction off our 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary traps numbered 1-5 & 75, NTA Convention will be in Lime, Ohio. Rockland County Trapper's have paid annual dues.

**Committee Reports**

**Scholarship** – no report

**Election Committee**-moved to later

**Youth Trapper's Camp**- 3 students already signed up for this year

**Fur Handler's Award**- C.A.N.Y may not be able to support the award going forward. Pat will provide applications.

**Convention**- People still requesting indoor space but none is available, all 3 buildings are 100% booked. Wayne reviewed all the camping rules. Entertainment is being offered for Saturday night starting at 8PM if we are interested.

**NTA**- Maine is having issues with bear trapping. Oregon is also facing anti-trapping issues. Gordy Berndt will be inducted into the NTA Trapper's Hall of Fame.

**FTA**-No report

**JTI**-Committee lost a valuable member with the death of Ed Hamilton. Has not met in about a year. Fisher management plan is going to be the main issue this coming year. Fisher numbers in the Central Adirondacks are down but they are expanding outside this traditional range. There is concern about the public comments that will come in response to the plan. Public may object to any expansion of the otter seasons. There was discussion about illegal activity and a lack of law enforcement.

**County Reports**

Region 9S will hold a fur auction 1/18/14.

Franklinville Furbearers will hold their first convention 6/27/-28 at the Franklinville Conservation Club.

**Executive Director's Report**

Approximately 5,700 trapping licenses sold between 10/1/13 – 1/16/14. Not much legislative activity. Cable restraint bill lost its' sponsor because the he resigned his seat over ethics issues. We are looking for a new sponsor. 48 hour check law for the entire state is still on the table. Snapping turtle trapping bill did not pass. Some DEC officials worry that turtle numbers are down.

March raffle tickets are available.

Spring Conference is April 12, 2014 in Ulster County.

**DEC Report**

No DEC personnel were available but the department passed along the following information. Gordon Batcheller is going to retire sometime next year. DEC wants to offer trapper training at their summer DEC camps. Paul Jensen is drafting the state wide fisher management plan framing objectives and strategies. **Treasurer's Report**

The treasurer's report was passed out on a separate cover. NYSTA received donations from C.A.N.Y., Oswego County, and Foothill Trappers. The report was approved as written.

**Old Business**

This is an election year for all state offices. Anyone interested in running has to submit the required statement of in-

terest along with the supporting letters to Bob Hughes by 6/30/14. Candidates will be announced at the fall convention. The ballots will be mailed between January and the spring conference.

Changes to the by-laws were discussed at the last meeting and Angie provided draft language to be voted on so ballots could be mailed out to the members. The Board of Director's voted to recommend the changes to: Article VIII-section 1-paragraph D unanimously, Article VIII-section 2, paragraphs C & D 9 yeas – 2 nays, Article III- section 2-paragraph B- carried unanimously, and Article III-section 2- 11 yeas – 21 nay. ( Changes are not outlined in detail here as the changes have been mailed out and voted on prior to the next B.O.D. meeting).

A new contract was drawn up for the position of Executive Director and reviewed with the board.

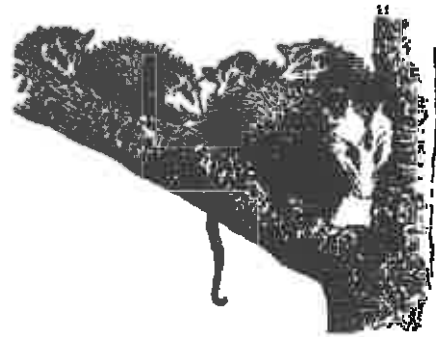
The meeting was adjourned at 3:34. The next meeting is April 26, 2014 at the Herkimer County Fairgrounds starting at 9AM.

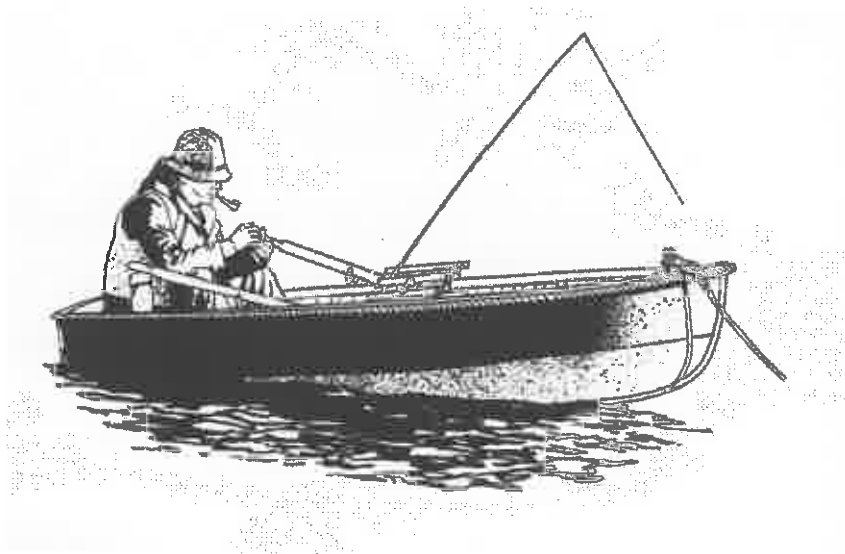
